A Word From The Lodge Troop Representative Chair



How many times have you seen this patch (see image right) on the Shoulder of a fellow Arrowman? Do you know what it means?

The patch means that

the youth wearing it is his unit's Order of the Arrow Troop Representative, or OA Troop Rep, but what is an OA Troop Rep?

OA Troop Rep is a leadership position that counts for rank advancement. The Senior Patrol Leader of that troop – with the approval of the Scoutmaster - appoints an arrowman (who usually asks him for the position). The Troop Rep's responsibilities are to go to his Chapter, or Lodge meetings, and bring back a report to his troop about the upcoming events. In addition, his job is to set-up and help with the Troop OA Election.

Now this may sound like a non-important job to the Order of the Arrow, but it really is. The OA Troop Rep helps get youth active in the OA by encouraging them to go to Chapter, Lodge, Section, Region, or even National Events like NOAC. So, what is the problem with OA Troop Rep? The problem is the lack of involvement. While it is a leadership position, and the responsibilities are clear, the youth who is in that position doesn't always do his job. He doesn't fulfill his obligations, and expects his leadership to just be signed off. Even though this position helps lodges out a lot – due to the effectiveness of youth asking youth to go to events – other lodges don't have active enough troop reps to make it work. If every lodge had effective OA Troop Reps, the entirety of OA would do better.

The Arrowman Service Award

Want to earn the only patch that you can wear on your OA sash?

You have a month left to earn the patch. One of the requirements is to attend one of our loges sponsored 100th event. Well you are in luck. We have two events scheduled for the month of December that fill this requirement. On December 11th we have Lodge Bowling (open to all lodge members) and December 26th we have our Vigil Fellowship Breakfast (open to Vigil members only). Complete the requirements by December 31, 2015, fill out the paperwork and submit it to our Lodge Adviser.

The purpose of the Arrowman Service Award (ASA) is to encourage Arrowmen to recommit themselves to the ideals of the Order, increase their level of service to their local unit and council, and participate in the 100th anniversary celebration of the OA. The award will have three categories of criteria with various requirements that Arrowmen can complete. These include components on personal growth, service to Scouting, and participation in the centennial celebration.
